The week in review

### "Jerusalem of 'Lead'..."

An Israeli man from Ofrah was shot and killed by Palestinian terrorists. The victim was killed at the Adam Junction, a few kilometers northwest of N'vei Yaakov, at the beginning of the Ramallah bypass highway leading from Jerusalem to Binyamin and Samaria. He and a friend were on their way home from work in Atarot when he was shot in the head, apparently by terrorists in a passing car.

### It's not business as usual

There was a demonstration Thursday morning outside the Prime Minister's Office in Jerusalem in protest of the deteriorating security situation in the Atarot Industrial Park in northern Jerusalem.

Participating in the demonstration were owners of businesses in the industrial park, the scene of recent terrorist attacks. Two employees of the park were killed in the past week and the approach roads to the northern Jerusalem industrial park that employees 4,000 have been the scenes of

numerous recent shooting attacks. Some businesses have closed their doors and employers are complaining that the lack of security is resulting in many laborers failing to report for work because they are too scared to drive on the area roads.

### Old-fashioned terror

Another major terrorist bombing near Netzarim was thwarted early this morning. Soldiers stationed near the Netzarim junction noticed a suspicious wagon hitched to a donkey; they shot at the wagon and it exploded.

### Mr. Flip-Flop

Efforts continue for a possible summit between Barak and Arafat, possibly this coming Sunday. The Prime Minister had said this week that he would not meet with Arafat before next week's election - as a result of Arafat's hateful speech against Israel in Davos - but Barak spokesmen explained that Arafat gave a "conciliatory" interview to Israel's Channel 2 this week. In addition, Foreign Minister Shlomo Ben-Ami said today, "Look, we're stuck with Arafat. He's a very difficult partner, but the way to peace in the Middle East passes through him."

## STUFF you should know

### Who is Mr. Arafat?

On Feb. 28, 1973, James J. Welsh, the National Security Agency's Palestinian analyst, was summoned by a colleague about a communication intercepted from Yasser Arafat involving an imminent Black September operation in Khartoum, Sudan.

Within minutes, Welsh recalls, the director of the NSA was notified and the decision was made to send a rare "FLASH" message -- the highest priority -- to the U.S. Embassy in Khartoum via the State Department.

But the message didn't reach the embassy in time. Somewhere between the NSA and the State Department, someone decided the warning was too vague. The alert was downgraded in urgency.

The next day, eight members of Black September, part of Arafat's Fatah organization, stormed the Saudi embassy in Khartoum, took U.S. Ambassador Cleo Noel, diplomat Charge d'Affaires George Curtis Moore and others hostage. A day later, on March 2, 1973, Noel, Moore and Belgian Guy Eid were machine-gunned to death -- all, Welsh charges, on the direct orders of Arafat.

Welsh, speaking publicly for the first time to WorldNetDaily, accuses the U.S. government of a 28-year-old cover-up of Arafat's role in the planning and execution of the attack.

"Over the years I have kept my silence about what I know about this tragic episode," Welsh told WorldNetDaily. "But recently I began to wonder how recent administrations could overlook something as terrible as this in our dealings with Yasser Arafat."

## PEOPLE of the BOOK

Now that we have a Camp David agreement signed, sealed and delivered, don't we have to live with it?

*Would it be legally and morally right to abrogate it unilaterally?*

"There are two major answers to this question. First of all, an agreement is binding on either party only as long as the other is carrying out its part..."

"... The second answer, which is equally valid, is that the Camp David Accords were based on a presumption that invalidated them in the first place. Clearly, no government official has the right to sign away the very security of the people and country he represents, nor the security of the next generation and subsequent generations, for no person can possibly have such a mandate, actual or implied. Certainly, in the present case, no such mandate was given -- on the contrary; there is an explicit and expressed unanimity that the security of the Land of Israel and its three-and-a-half million Jews is not negotiable. Since the Camp David agreement does indeed jeopardize the security of the people and land of Israel, no signature, or even ratification, can be binding..."
